Sewer Utility Code for the Irondale and Port Hadlock Urban Growth Area

Chapters 13.01 through 13.09 of the Jefferson County Code

Statement of Issue:

Public Works staff will brief the County Commissioners regarding the proposed Jefferson County Sewer Utility Code for the Irondale and Port Hadlock Urban Growth Area (PHUGA) Chapters 13.01 through 13.09. Today's discussion will provide a general overview of the code sections, propose a schedule for more in-depth Board workshops of certain sections of the code, and seek input from the Board regarding public outreach and final adoption of the sewer code.

Analysis/Strategic Goals/Pro's & Con's:

The Port Hadlock Urban Growth Area Wastewater Treatment System (PHUGA Sewer System) has been discussed and considered for multiple years. There are many components that go into the creation of a new utility. The design and construction of the wastewater treatment plant, low pressure sewer collection system, and on-site grinder pump connections are in progress. In addition to the design and construction of the PHUGA Sewer System, County staff has created the proposed Sewer Utility Code.

In general, the sewer code includes the following sections:

- Establishment of a Sewer Utility
- Definitions
- Authority and partnerships
- Connection requirements
- Proposed sewer monthly rates, charges, fees, and low-income discounts
- Sewage discharge standards and restrictions
- Processes, such as enforcement, latecomer agreements, appeals

The table of contents of the sewer utility code is included as an attachment to this agenda request.

There has been an enormous amount of work to create the current draft of the sewer utility code. The code was created by researching multiple jurisdictions' sewer codes (county codes, city codes and public utility codes) and using parts of these sewer codes which best fit the PHUGA. In addition, financial analysis of various sewer charges, fees, and rates was performed throughout the sewer utility code development. Once a draft code was created, County staff began "ground truthing" the research and financial analysis through public outreach. Staff met individually with many PHUGA community property owners and stakeholders in order to address the specific needs of this community and obtain

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feedback. Outreach included meetings with individual property owners to review parts of the proposed sewer code language, specifically the connection policy; check in meetings with county commissioners; meetings with non-profit agencies (Habitat for Humanity, Peninsula Housing Authority, OlyCAP, and Bayside Housing) to discuss low-income rate programs and obtain feedback; and meetings with the PUD No. 1 of Jefferson County (JPUD) on administering low-income programs and billing.

The County's legal team has reviewed the code and made many improvements through multiple rounds of revisions.

Staff would like to propose the following road map for adoption the final sewer utility code

- July 2024 Workshop or Special Meeting of the Board of County Commissioners to review the Sewer Utility Code Connection Policy (13.04)
- July/August 2024 Workshop or Special Meeting of the Board of County Commissioners to review the Sewer Utility Code – Sewer Rates, Charges and Fees including Low Income Program (13.05 and Fee Schedule Appendix)
- August 2024 Workshop or Special Meeting of the Board of County Commissioners for remaining sections of code and follow up from prior meetings.
- September 2024 Sewer Utility Code Public Hearing
- September 2024 Follow up Public Hearing (if needed). Potential adoption.

Fiscal Impact/Cost Benefit Analysis:

Today's briefing has no fiscal impact. Future adoption of this code will impose charges for sewer service that will be used to operate the sewer utility. The County and Port Hadlock community has been fortunate to receive unprecedented amounts of State and Federal grant funds to construct this sewer; however, user charges will be required to fund utility operations.

Recommendation:

Today's discussion will be an opportunity for the Board to engage with staff on a broad overview of the draft sewer utility code as well as the path to its ultimate adoption.
